A Vision for the Future

Christ is Risen! When Jesus rose from the dead the angels told the Myrrh-bearing Women to go tell the disciples that He is Risen and goes before them to Galilee, to the mountain to which He directed them. It is there that Jesus commissions the disciples to "Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all that I have commanded you..." (Matt. 28:19-20, RSV). This is the moment that Jesus' Disciples became Apostles. From that moment on, all those baptized into Christ and put on Christ also take up their equal share in that same Great Commission. Having considered this fact, are you ready?

Last Fall our parish participated in a survey that provided us with an assessment of our activity. The Parish Council is currently in the process of reviewing that assessment and laying the ground work for a strategic planning process. For the first time in our existence, St. Demetrios parish will have a Strategic Plan, a defined strategy to allocate our resources to achieve our vision. As we develop this plan together, we will answer the following questions:

- 1. Why do we exist?
- 2. Where are we now?
- 3. Where do we want to be?
- 4. How will we get there?

Albert Einstein once said, "We cannot solve our problems with the same thinking we used when we created them." Our Commission as Orthodox Christians is to share this unchanging Faith we hold so dear with an ever-changing world. Our Orthodox Christian Faith never changes, but how we convey it absolutely must. We must think of our parish not as it was, but how it could be.

"Making disciples of all nations" is an enormous undertaking! This is the vision. Jesus also gave His disciples a strategic plan. In Acts 1:8, Jesus tells them, "you shall be my witnesses in Jerusalem and in all Judea and Samaria and to the end of the earth." In other words, Jesus instructs the Apostles to first wait or prepare, then start locally, and then gradually expand to the rest of the land, ultimately going beyond Israel throughout the entire world. Our strategic plan will maintain this Scriptural basis. Our parish has internal needs and external needs of those around us. Our parish is also a part of a much larger whole. We are interconnected with our Metropolis, Archdiocese, Patriarch Bartholomew; our sister parishes of Northeast Ohio; and our non-Orthodox friends and neighbors.



Our parish has accomplished a great deal in its 65 years of existence, and we wouldn't be here if it weren't for our parents, grandparents, and founders. Our mission now is to honor their legacy by sharing what they have built with everyone we possibly can.

Such an undertaking is going to take serious effort from the entire community. Our Parish Council has only taken the first step in listening to everyone. There will be more opportunities to share your thoughts, both in writing and in townhall meetings. Our strategic plan will be just that, ours. May God lead us together as we prepare a vision for the future of St. Demetrios parish.

General Assembly April 7 Recap

- 1. MISSION TRIP Jake Trotter reported about the mission trip to New Mexico (See page 6.)
- 2. AUDIT COMMITTEE: John Poulos reported that the audit was conducted by a professional, independent firm. Anyone interested in reviewing can get a copy of the report from the committee.
- **3. PRIEST'S REPORT** Fr. Andy reported:
- -The Epistle will now be in color, due to the printer getting a new machine and making it more affordable.
- -Request for volunteers to be delegate at National Clergy Laity; Eleni Papouras-Jenks volunteered and was approved.
- -Parish Council meeting to discuss strategic process based on the 2023 survey and make a plan; the survey will be shared with the parish. Board established an exploratory committee for iconography on the church walls.
- 4. 2024 ELECTION COMMITTEE: Nominations were taken from the floor and approved unanimously:

Steve Alex, Mary Diamond, Tina Kolas, Jeanne Paras, Dee Stavrulakis, and Donna Vassos.

- **5. FESTIVAL REPORT** Kosta Mathiellis requested those with businesses or who wish to make a personal message to support the Ad Book. Thanks to the cooks to date.
- 6. CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS Nick Hillman of the Home Committee reported that the new bathrooms officially open. Delays and overage partly due to the cost of the tiles, \$2000 needed to drill plumbing lines, and misunderstanding on what was taxable (materials but NOT labor.) We need to pay the final \$20,500 to the contractor by the weekend. The overage has been requested from the Legacy Fund.
- We must replace the three roofs (above hallway, offices and classrooms) due to leaks and being out of warranty.

Also the three 15-ton HVAC units (1 is totally out and another needs a \$7000 repair.) The cost to replace all three is \$280,000. Discussion ensued.

John Poulos made a MOTION to proceed to replace all three roofs and 2 AC units ASAP, not exceed \$220,000. Manuel Glynias 2nd . since we do not want seams and need warranties to line up (the old warranties expired in 2016). Discussion ensued.

Steve Alex amended MOTION to include a contingency amount to a total of \$315,000. Manny Glynias 2nd.

The MOTION passed unanimously.

-Steve Alex made a MOTION to approve payment of \$8000 overage on the bathroom project. Jeanne Paras 2nd.

The Motion passed unanimously.

- 7. PALM SUNDAY LUNCH Offered by Legacy Fund free to all; short video will be shown about the fund.
- 8. STEWARDSHIP Kelly Pallas reported (see left)
- 9. PHILANTHROPY Kosta Mathiellis reported on the Legacy Philanthropy Committee and Jeanne Paras reported on Philoptochos (see p. 6)
- 10. NEW BUSINESS Nick Hillman asked why the live streaming was not working the past two Sundays. Eleni Papouras-Jenks explained that it was a glitch in running it, and it should be corrected going forward.

ASLEEP IN THE LORD



Demetrius "Jim" Andressakis, husband of Lois, father of Chrisoula and Katherina, grandfather of three, passed away March 28, 2024. He had served in the Greek Navy and later as a marine engineer for the Onassis Shipping company. After marrying his wife (of 50

years,) they settled in Cleveland where he worked at the Ford Motor Co and earned a degree at CSU. The couple were long-time members of St Demetrios, and very active in our Greek School PTO and our Greek festival. At age 60, Jim ran and completed the Athens Marathon. The couple moved to Illinois 10 years ago to be closer to family, and also spent much time in Jim's native Galixidi, Greece, where he was laid to rest.



Aphrodite Palos, mother of Peter (Cindy) and Diane (Frank), grandmother of one; great-grandmother of two; and relative of many in Edessa, Greece, passed away March 25, 2024. She had been a member of both St. Demetrios and Annunciation Churches.



Fr. Michael Gulgas, husband of Pres. Tina, father of Constantine (Michaela) and Spyridon, grandfather of Niko and Elaina, brother of John, uncle and spiritual father of many, passed away April 7, 2024. He attended Youngstown State University before transferring to

Hellenic College/ Holy Cross School of Theology, where he studied under Bishop Maximos. Upon graduating in 1982, he married Tina Frangos, and was soon after ordained into the priesthood. He served as an assistant at St. Nicholas Greek Orthodox Church of Flushing, NY for 2 years, and was then assigned as the pastor of St. Nicholas Greek Orthodox Church of Lorain. Fr. Michael served St Nicholas parish for more than 38 years, until his retirement in 2022, making him the longest tenured pastor of that community in its 101-year history. He had married many couples for whom he then baptized their children, celebrated the marriages of those children, and then baptized their children! He truly loved watching over his parishioners as his own growing family. Pres. Tina taught in the Lorain City Schools for 30 years, making them "the preacher and the teacher" tag team. Fr. Michael's pastimes were 'writing' Byzantine-style icons (one of which, an icon of St. Nicholas, can be venerated in the Narthex of St. Nicholas,) perfecting his Byzantine chant with his brotherin-law Larry Frangos, and reading about the founding fathers of the Church and of American history.

We also extend our condolences to Gregory, Sue and Angelo Coutris on the loss of their mother Fotini.





Africa & Byzantium: A Divine Collaboration

Colorful icons, priceless manuscripts, intricate mosaics and other stunning items are now on view at the Cleveland Museum of Art's *Africa & Byzantium*. The exhibit runs until July 21, 2024, having been on view at New York City's Metropolitan Museum of Art, the only other U.S. city in which it will have been shown.

CMA Curator of African Art, Dr. Kristen Windmuller-Luna (pictured right with Eleni Papouras-Jenks and Archimandrite Porphyrios) first hinted of putting it together four years ago, but was delayed by the Covid shutdowns. Many of the artefacts have never been outside their home countries, which include Tunisia, Morocco, Ethiopia and Egypt. A few items displayed are even part of the CMA permanent collection.

Last month, I was honored to serve as the interpreter for Archimandrite Porphyrios of the Greek Orthodox monastery of St. Catherine of the God-trodden Mount Sinai, Egypt. It is located at the very place where God appeared to Moses in the Burning Bush, and also where the holy relics of Saint Catherine are enshrined. This is the oldest continuously inhabited Christian monastery, traced back over 17 centuries. The monastery has never been destroyed in all its history, and therefore its library has preserved intact manuscripts and early printed books, as well as the most important collection of pre-iconoclastic panel icons. Byzantine rulers such as St. Helen and Emperor Justinian have been protectors and patrons.

On April 10, the visitors and dignitaries who have lent items to the exhibit were given a sneak preview, led by the Curator, followed by a videotaped press conference. The following day, they also spoke to a gathering of museum members and donors (including many members of the Wade family, who was among the original contributors of the museum in 1916.) The Greek Orthodox community was represented by members of the Hellenic Preservation Society (pictured right center: Charles & Sophia Johnson, Jonathon Cambouris, Archimandrite Porphyrios, Eleni, and Lou Frangos; not pictured: Helen Collis and Maribeth Lekas)

Archimandrite spoke movingly in Greek (which I then repeated in English) about the history of the monastery and its importance to global cultures. He recalled Dostoyevsky's words about how beauty will save the world – noting that 'beauty' is Christ's love. He then invited all to come visit or support St. Catherine's Monastery and experience for themselves.

In order to lend these priceless artefacts, the monastery requires that monk accompany Archimandrite Porphyrios flew to New York and brought the items to Cleveland in March. He is remaining in Cleveland until mid-June, when another monk will come accompany the relics back to the monastery when the exhibition ends in July. During his stay, he has visited the five Greek Orthodox parishes in northeast Ohio. We were honored to host him at St. Demetrios on March 31, when Fr. Jim Doukas served as the interpreter of his homily (pictured, right)



St. Catherine's Monastery has lent several icons (pictured, right) and a centuries-old manuscript to the exhibit. Other items from around Africa and museums in Europe and the U.S. include pottery, textiles, mosaics, coins, and more. The icon The exhibit space itself is a major factor in the experience. Windows offer sneak peaks into the upcoming galleries, as if you were looking in through a window. Items created during the Byzantine empire are in rooms painted imperial purple, while the items from a north African Jewish synagogue are in a pale green room. One especially stunning gallery mimics the round churches of Ethiopia, with the iconography in the center. On the far wall is a life size photo of priest in front of an iconostasis, mounted in a way to appear as if he is waiting for you. There is also a gallery featuring Islamic calligraphy manuscripts.

As part of the opening week of the exhibit, the CMA was finally able to present the long-awaited concert "Antennae," inspired by *Icon of the Mother of God and Infant Christ*

(Virgin Eleousa.)

Composer Aleksandra Vrebalov (pictured second from left, with cantors of Capella Romana, Archimandrite Porphyrios and Eleni) was commissioned to write a "site-specific" concert, written expressly to be performed in the CMA Byzantine gallery and the Ames Family Atrium.

In the first part, Capella Romana,



a supergroup of proto-psaltes (head cantors) from around the world, including Tinos, New Orleans, Washington D.C., London and more, chanted in Gallery 105 in front of the Virgin Eleousa icon. Hearing director Alex Lingas (pictured above, third from the left) who also chanted at the coronation of King Charles III last year, chanting in Cleveland's museum was an amazing experience. The second part of the concert was in the cavernous atrium, where Capella Romana continued Byzantine style chant, and was joined by a western style choir (with sopranos, altos, tenors and bass) who sang in Gregorian chant. Large bells were located on the balcony overlooking the atrium which lent an effect of hearing far-off churches. In each corner, behind the audience's chairs were brass instruments, and finally a string quartet moved in and out of the audience. The concert concluded with choir members processing with *talanton* (wooden percussion used in Orthodox monasteries.) The unique experience was made even more memorable with the presence of the composer, who is Serbian Orthodox. She graciously socialized with members of the audience at the conclusion of the show. Capella Romana was gracious enough to donate a CD of their music entitled *Voices of Byzantium: Medieval Byzantine Chant from Mt. Hellenic Preservation Society

There are a handful of ancient cultures whose impact is so powerful that they cross millennia and affect global culture, even to the present. The culture of ancient Greece is one of them. None other than Albert Einstein once said, "How can any educated person stay away from the Greeks? I have always been far more interested in them than in science."

One might ask, how did our ancient ancestors fight multiple wars and still engender the fertility of thought so profound as to remain relevant today? How did Greek culture pierce the veil of its own mythology to eventually embrace the Triune God of the Orthodox Church? How did the Greeks from 2800 years ago flourish, then survive centuries of Roman rule, only to become enslaved by the Ottomans for 400 years; and then get through modern World and Civil wars? These questions are not rhetorical.

From here in the 21st Century, we might typically see Greek culture through a looking glass that reveals a legacy of ruined and shattered temples, of statues missing limbs, of friezes lost to the ages, and of sherds of pottery at archeological sites. If only these ruins could talk. Ah, but perhaps they do!

They speak through the ancient written records and timeless accounts that have influenced today's concepts of democratic government, philosophy, mathematics, science, medicine, literature, drama, architecture, and, yes, even sports. Names like Pericles, Cleisthenes, Plato, Euclid, Pythagoras, Democritus, Hippocrates, Aristotle, Homer, Socrates, Herodotus, Thucydides, and Pheidippides are part of our educational curricula at every level of study. Combined with modern Greek culture and the geographic beauty of Greece, whose islands nestle in waters so deeply blue as to shame cobalt, the wisdom and insights of our ancestors come to us as unwitting beneficiaries and heirs to Hellenism.

But even a culture as self-preserving as ours requires stewardship to thrive in modern society. That's where the Hellenic Preservation Society of Northeastern Ohio (HPS) enters. HPS has been around for decades, during which time it has advocated for Hellenism by sponsoring or supporting books, educational programs, ethnic/cultural parades, church festivals, social events, book signings, the Collis Lectures at CMA, and the Hellenic Cultural Garden in Cleveland.

In late 2023, the Garden became its own 501(c)(3) non-profit entity and is no longer under the purview of HPS, which will continue to work with its new sister organization to support and promote Hellenic Culture in Northeastern Ohio.

And so, as we adjust organizationally, our future looks bright. This month, HPS will begin its 2024 Membership drive under a separate mailing and capable direction of Membership Committee chair Renee Sadler. We ask that you respond favorably and as generously as you can.



This month, our series "Saints of the British Isles" introduces us to two more of the saintly Archbishops of Canterbury.

St. Dunstan of Canterbury (May 19)

He was born to a noble family near Glastonbury, Wessex, England, in the 10th century, but educated by Irish monks from the abbey at Glastonbury. While a youth, he was sent to the court of King Athelstan. He was an artisan, proficient as a goldsmith and metalworker. However, around 934, Dunstan chose to be tonsured a monk and ordained a priest, living for a time as a hermit.

In 943, the new King Edmund called him to the royal court and appointed him Abbot of Glastonbury. At the abbey, he re-established a monastic life under the Rules of St Benedict. Under his leadership, the abbey was rebuilt and prospered, becoming a center of learning. At the same time, Dunstan helped revitalize nearby monasteries.

After King Edmund was murdered, Edred became king. St. Dunstan became King Edred's advisor, and began a reformation of all the monasteries in the kingdom. In time, St. Dunstan became involved in West Saxon politics, and developed enemies when he censured King Edred's nephew, Edwy, for his scandalous lifestyle. In 955, Edwy succeeded Edred on the throne, and quickly took his revenge on Abbot Dunstan by confiscating his property and sending him into exile. St. Dunstan fled to the Abbey of Mont Blandin, in Flanders, near Ghent, where, he experienced for the first time the disciplined life of the Benedictine order that he'd tried to introduce at Glastonbury.

However, he did not stay in Flanders long, because toward the end of 957, Edwy's excesses resulted in a revolt. Edwy was driven from the throne to the lands north of the River Thames, and his brother Edgar installed as king. St. Dunstan was asked to return, and Archbishop Oda of Canterbury consecrated him a Bishop of Worcester. In 958, when the See of London became vacant, it was also conferred on Bishop Dunstan. Finally, in 960, King Edgar named Dunstan Archbishop of Canterbury.

St. Dunstan travelled to Rome to receive the pallium of office from Pope John XII. On his return, he became a close advisor of King Edgar, and gained a position as virtual ruler of the kingdom. From this position, he pushed forth reforms in the life of the realm, both within the Church and in the State. The crowning point of Archbishop Dunstan's work and statesmanship was the coronation of King Edgar in 973. The coronation service written by St. Dunstan became the basis for the British coronation service used through today, as witnessed by the recent coronation of King Charles III.

Two years later, Edgar died, and was succeeded by his oldest son, Edward, whom Dunstan crowned in Winchester. But in March 978, King Edward was murdered by his step-mother's agents, and was succeeded by his step-brother, Ethelred the Unready. The coronation of Ethelred was the last action of state performed by Abp. Dunstan. After Ethelred took the usual oath, Abp. Dunstan addressed the new king, rebuking him for the brutal act that brought him to the throne and prophesized the coming misfortunes that were to fall on the realm. (Truly, the relics of the martyr Edward had wonderworking properties, and were later re-interred with honors by his step-brother.) With this, St. Dunstan's influence at the court came to an end.

He retired to Canterbury, where he spent the remainder of his life, active in his duties within the church. He reposed on May 19, 988, and was buried in his cathedral in Canterbury. He was canonized a saint in 1029. Later, his relics were translated to a tomb near the high altar of the new cathedral after the original burned in 1074.

St. Alphege (April 19)

This saint, also called Godwine, was an Anglo-Saxon, born around 953. He became an anchorite* before being elected abbot of Bath Abbey. He was then appointed Bishop of Winchester, and in 1006 became the 28th Archbishop of Canterbury, due to his perceived piety and sanctity. St. Alphege encouraged learning, and he is the one who largely contributed to the honoring of St. Dunstan of Canterbury. In 1011, he was captured by Viking raiders. When he refused to allow himself to be ransomed, they matyred him on April 19, 1012. Thomas Becket, a later Archbishop of Canterbury, prayed for his intercessions just before his own murder in Canterbury Cathedral.

*An anchorite (from the Ancient Greek: άναχωρέω = 'I withdraw, retire') is someone who, for religious reasons, withdraws from secular society to be able to lead an intensely prayer-orientated, ascetic, or Eucharistfocused life. Unlike hermits, who often wandered a region, anchorites were required to take a vow of stability of place, opting for permanent enclosure in cells often attached to churches. Anchorites were subject to a religious rite of consecration that closely resembled the funeral rite, following which they would be considered dead to the world and a type of living saint. They also had a certain autonomy, as they did not answer to any ecclesiastical authority apart from bishops.

Anchorites committed to a life of uncompromising enclosure. Some refused to leave their cells even when pirates or looters were pillaging their towns and consequently burned to death when the church was torched. They ate frugal meals, spending their days both in contemplative prayer and interceding on behalf of others. Servants tended to the basic needs of anchorites, providing food and water, and removing waste.

It is one of the earliest forms of Christian monasticism and became most widespread in the Middle Ages. In medieval England, the earliest recorded anchorites lived in the 11th century. Their highest number—around 200—was recorded in the 13th century. From the 12th to the 16th centuries, female anchorites consistently outnumbered their male counterparts. (Source: orthodoxwiki.org)

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






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
